Our condolences go out to Bobby, Julie, and Mary Kelley Tucker on the loss of their talented horse, Firestorm a.k.a.

Charlie. It is so hard when they have to leave us. Mary Kelley described him in a Facebook post recently:

"I could write a book on this horse alone and the lessons he taught me. I could go on and on forever about the doors he opened for me and things I was able to accomplish because of him. It was pure luck and fate that caused our paths to cross 22 years ago. We had stopped at Stoner Ridge Farm to ask Bob is he was give riding lessons, and while we were there we looked at this red chocolate yearling colt. Dad decided he wanted him, and he would call him Charlie, after Charlie DeAtley. To us he was Charlie, but to many he was better known as Firestorm. This horse truly was the versatile Mountain Horse. He not only competed in the ring, but he was also my dad's personal trail horse for years and on occasion he was used on 4H Drill Teams. His favorite thing was to be in the ring though - the louder the crowd, the better the ride. You could feel him change the moment you pointed him toward the entry gate. One of his greatest qualities was his stamina and his ability to only get better as the night went on. It wasn't unusual for us to show him in 4 - 5 classes a show. Firestorm carried me through every stage of my show career. He was there for the majority of my youth shows, winning multiple titles and high points for me along the way. He was the first horse I ever showed at the RMHA International in 2008. That same International I won my first RMHA International blue ribbon in 12-17 AOT Show Pleasure. A few years later, for my brief time as an Amateur/AOT rider, he won the 2011 AOT Show Pleasure Grand Championship giving me my first International Grand Championship title as an adult. Then I showed him for the final time at the beginning of having my professional card. I wouldn't be the rider or competitor I am today without him. Firestorm won multiple titles and high point awards with UMH, KMSHA, and RMHA in Amateur, AOT, Novice, and Youth. A once in a lifetime type horse that we were blessed to have stumbled on to many years ago. Until we meet again, I'll cherish the memories.'
