After 20 plus years in the business, I have had the opportunity to ride all kinds of horses. Some were just ok, some I'd rather not talk about and some will always hold a special place in my memories. Blueberry Wine was one of the latter - she was very special. Unfortunately, on April 3rd, we had to say goodbye to her. Blueberry had lived several years with a condition known as heaves. Unfortunately, it is not reversible and only the symptoms can be treated. She was able to live comfortably outside in the open air for years and produce beautiful foals again and again. As winter passed this year, it was evident that her condi-

tion was worsening and could no longer be treated. I have ridden horses with more action than her, but she still had plenty. Blueberry really was the total package. She had the sweetest personality, plenty of heart, drive and willingness to work. Even as a show pleasure horse, I trusted her enough to let Ruby (as a baby), ride with me - and Ruby liked going fast. Blueberry was a strong contender in the open classes, amateur classes with her owner in the irons and even in the juvenile classes with Thomas Howard. My first vivid memory of her was her performance in the RMHA

Show Pleasure Grand Championship as a three year old with Derick Tipton aboard. Nancy Copland bought her later and then Steve Heuslein bought her from Nancy. Blueberry will be missed but not forgotten. She was the dam to Tank Commander and Whole Lot of Blue. She also leaves behind three very nice fillies: One by Call Me Chicago, (Chicago Blues) one by Merry Go Blue (Blue Mountain Girl) and one by Above The Law (She's Unlawful). Her legacy will live on. A lot of people don't like mares, but that's because they haven't had one like Blueberry Wine. She was a good 'un!!!
